Soft Embroidery



YOU WILL NEED:

- Tracing paper
- Frixion pen
- 20 cm square of blue-coloured fabric (not elastic)
- Embroidery hoop, 15 cm
- Embroidery needle
- Scissors
- Anchor Stranded Cotton embroidery threads

STITCHES:

Chain stitch

Fly stitch

Hair thread set up

Plain stitch

Running stitch

Stem stitch

Woven wheel stitch







GETTING STARTED

Transfer your drawing onto the fabric. Centre the hoop over the design and secure, making it ready for stitching. Pull the fabric taut.

Hat

I Start by embroidering the hat using the woven wheel stitch. First, embroider the circular lines with straight stitches. Important: the number of lines must be odd! Embroider these lines with 6 strands of 0887.

2 Next, begin to stitch above and below the lines with soft embroidery 0887. Don't insert the needle through the fabric, but work as if it were a loom, weaving between the threads in a circular way.

3 Once the circle of the hat is finished, begin working on the border of its brim. Mark vertical lines to use as a guide. Embroider using straight stitches along these lines with 6 strands of 0887. For this, it's not important whether the lines are odd or even.



4 Repeat the woven wheel stitch that we did previously in step 2 (without inserted the needle on the fabric).


5 For the hat band, embroider it using stem stitch with 6 strands of black thread. Make a line and then go back over the figure with another line of the same stitch, using this technique to make a fill stitch. The boater hat is ready!

6 Continue with the circular shape by using running stitches around the semi circles with 6 strands of black thread. With the 6 strands of 0843, pass through the running stitch from top to bottom until you go through all the black stitches, creating a lace effect.

Shirt

7 Make the character's shirt with a stem stitch in light blue with 6 strands of 161.

8 Use chain stitch to embroider the straps of the backpack with 6 strands of 1044. With the same green colour and the fly stitch, embroider the trees.






Hairstyle

9 Start by cutting 6 strands of 906. We will make 16 threads 10 cm in length. Thread one and tie a knot at the end.

10 Thread from back to front in the hair area and remove the needle, completing each strand one by one until you reach 16. If you want more volume, add more strands.

11 It's time to be the hairdresser! Comb to separate the strands and make the effect of the hair more real. Then we braid as if it were your hair! You can also make a ponytail or leave it loose! If you want to leave the hair down, I recommend that you fill the sides of the hat with strands to create more hair. Knot with any colour of thread that you have used and cut.

12 As a last step, add some rays to the design with 1 strand of 161.





Lettering

The letters have two steps. First the stem stitch and then on the same stitch the plain stitch. This effect makes the letters have more volume.




FINISHING

And voila! We already have our scout finished. Remember that you can play hairdresser and undo or change the hairstyle whenever you want!






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
